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Salem's Bike-Ped Corridor Continues to Move Forward

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Tuscan Village, the Depot Intersection and the Salem High School addition and renovations projects seem to garner much of the community's attention lately. A project that has been slowly gaining recognition is the development of Salem's Bike-Ped corridor. A few years ago, Salem was successful in receiving a grant, in collaboration with the Town of Windham, to build the first phase of the Bike-Ped corridor in Salem and the continuation of the Bike-Ped corridor in the Town of Windham. The second phase of the project, from Old Rockingham Road to Willow Street, started earlier this year, and is currently under design with an anticipated construction date of Spring 2018. Tuscan Village will be constructing the bike-ped section in front of its development, which will complete a major part of the corridor from the Salem/Windham town line to Rockingham Park Boulevard.

The present Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) project includes approximately 0.3 miles of paved rail trail running from Rockingham Park Boulevard to Cluff Crossing Road. At the intersection of Rockingham Park Boulevard and South Broadway (Route 28) two significant road crossings will be created. The bike-ped corridor will cross Rockingham Park Boulevard with a series of three crosswalks separated by refuge islands. This intersection will also include a crosswalk across Route 28, which is a significant barrier to bicycle and pedestrian travel in Salem. Connecting sidewalk segments will be constructed along the north-eastern corner of the intersection to strategically fill a gap in sidewalk infrastructure. At the southern end of the project bounds, two additional sidewalk segments will be constructed to connect with the existing sidewalk on Cluff Crossing Road, providing access to a large high

-density residential area. These crosswalks and sidewalks all contribute toward creating a network of bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure spanning out from the bike-ped corridor and increasing its connectivity value.

There are 4,800 households along and within a ¼ mile of Route 28, many of which work, play, and shop in the surrounding retail districts. On the west side of Route 28 alone there are multiple dense commercial zones, large parking lots, seventy curb cuts, and nine large intersecting roadways. These existing conditions are anything but continuous and inviting for pedestrian travel. As a result, residents have no other viable option than to use motor vehicles for short trips that could otherwise be achieved on foot or by bicycle.

The goal of this project is to provide a safe alternative transportation opportunity for Salem residents, as well as to decrease motor vehicle usage and congestion on Route 28 in Salem. To accomplish this goal, our proposed project will add 0.3 miles to the Salem Bike-Ped Corridor, which runs along the abandoned Manchester & Lawrence rail line parallel and adjacent to Route 28. This will create a direct pedestrian link to neighboring commercial districts, including Rockingham Plaza and Tuscan Village, to which many of these household members travel to work, shop, and play. This project builds upon the success of earlier efforts to extend pedestrian and bicycle access along the entire Route 28 corridor. The first completed phase of Salem Bike-Ped Corridor has been received with enthusiasm in the community and there is great excitement to see these efforts continue south along the rail corridor.

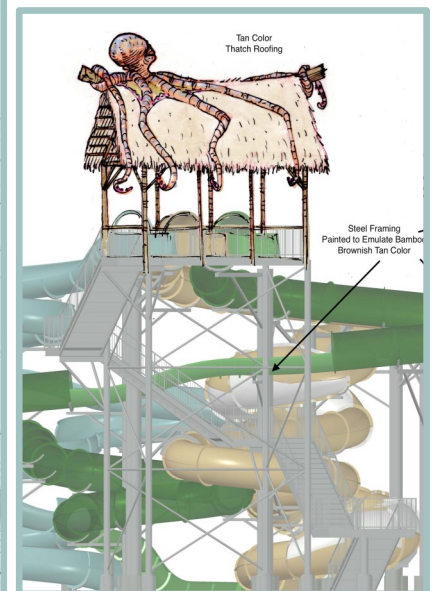
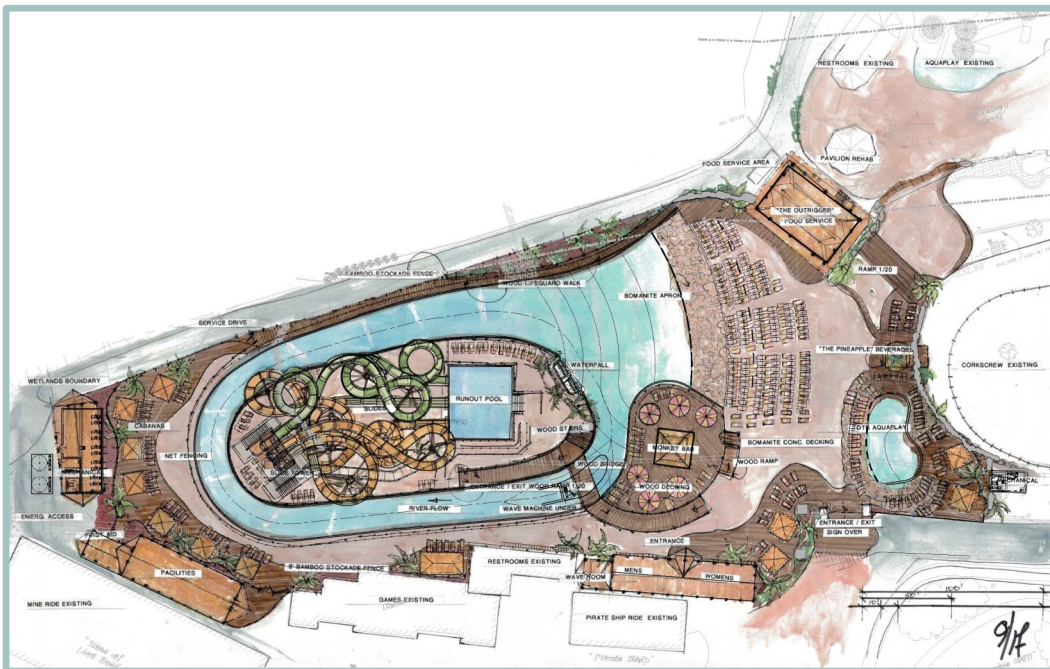

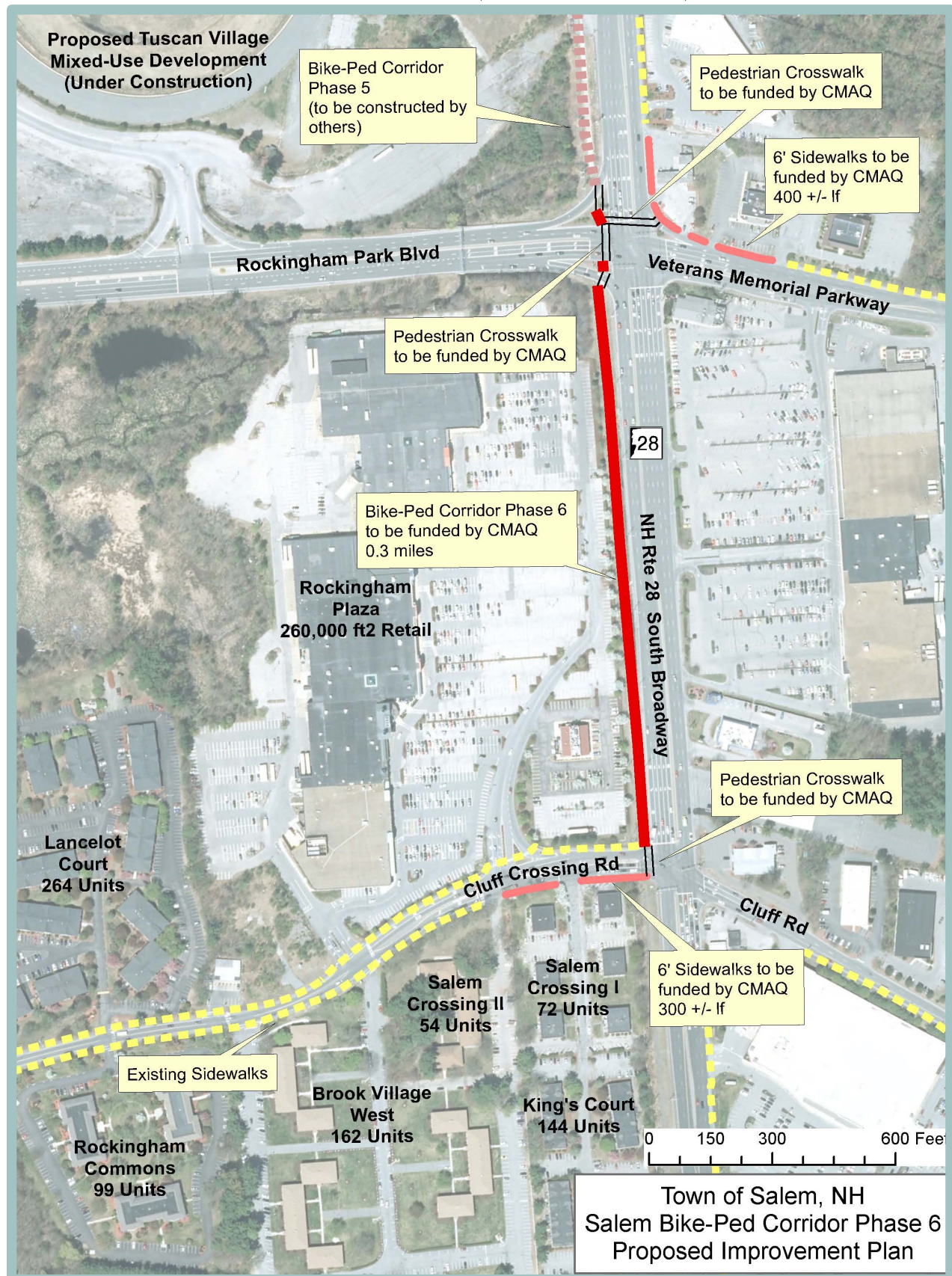

Tax Collector

PRESS RELEASE

October 13, 2017

The Town of Salem, New Hampshire will be mailing the second installment of the 2017 Property Tax bills by October 20, 2017. The first bill that was sent to property owners in May 2017, represented approximately one-half of the 2016 assessment. This bill is for the entire 2017 Property Tax minus the amount previously billed in May.

The 2017 Property Tax Rate is as follows:

State Edu.	\$ 2.28
County	1.06
Local Edu.	10.90
Municipal	6.60
Total	\$ 20.84

The 2017 Property Tax rate of \$20.84 per thousand is an increase of \$.41 cents per thousand from the 2016 Property Tax rate of \$ 20.43 per thousand.

The overall results of the rate are: Municipal portion of the bill remained the same as 2016; the Local Education rate increased \$.48 cents; State Education rate decreased \$.11 cents; and the County rate increased \$.04 cents.

Property tax bills are due and payable on or before December 1, 2017, or there will be a 12 % per annum interest charge. Just a reminder that the Town Hall is closed Thursday November 23rd and Friday November 24th for the Thanksgiving holiday.

If your bank holds your property taxes in escrow, you will need to forward your bill to them. If you do not receive a bill, especially if you are a new home owner, please contact our office at 890-2109 so we may send one to you. You may also view/pay your bill online by accessing our website at:

ENGINEERING DIVISION

2017 Road Program work has been delayed a bit by rain, but continues on Meadow Lane and Sylvan Drive where base paving has been completed. Work on Carriage Lane will follow. A draft 2018 Road Program will be presented to the Board of Selectmen at their November 6th meeting. The Pleasant Street box culvert has been installed by Tuscan Village contractors. A water-proofing membrane will be installed, water routed to the new box, and the old culvert removed, after which the road can be backfilled and re-stored. A Public Hearing was held for the Main St./ N. and S. Broadway intersection (the "Depot") project on October 19th. Now that the 10-day public comment period has ended, the Hearing Commission will evaluate the necessity for the project. Our consultants are working to wrap up the NEPA process, which is a prerequisite for right-of-way acquisitions.

PUBLIC WORKS DIVISION



Line painting including hand work has been ongoing at town buildings with stop bars, arrows, and parking lot markings. Grass mowing, weeding, and trimming continue routinely with the completion of fall fertilization application. Over 100 mums and 16 kale were planted around town at welcome to Salem signs. Staff has also been busy cleaning and landscaping various veteran markers throughout the town. A lot of time and effort was put into troubleshooting HVAC issues at multiple buildings in town due to the muggy weather. This is also the time of year when winter preparation begins by sending out contracts to the various contractors. Winter equipment has also been brought in for maintenance purposes. Catch basin repairs also continue as staffing allows entering the end of the construction season. The mill and overlay work wrapped up with final paving on Marie Ave including extensive drainage work.

UTILITIES DIVISION

A new fire hydrant was added to the 6" dead end on Park Street for better water quality. The new project on Lawrence Road (Granite Woods) was pressure tested, chlorinated, and flushed. The new 12" HDPE water main was installed around the box culvert on Pleasant Street as part of the Tuscan Village project. Water production continues to be below average with the daily average demand coming in around 2.3 million gallons. Canobie Lake is 2.5' higher than it was at this time last year during the drought. Systems were busy with repairs and replacements including the #3 high lift pump electrical contact switch, two air release valves for the 24" Arlington Pond raw water transmission line, and various sewer manholes. Millville Lake and Arlington Pond began drawdown. Final trench repair was finished for the miscellaneous water projects throughout the town.
