## Salem Fire Alarm Operator Awarded Telecommunicator of the Year

Fire Alarm Operator Robert Sprague, Badge #132, was awarded the distinguished Telecommunicator of the Year award by the New Hampshire Emergency Dispatchers Association at their annual meeting at the Red Jacket Inn in North Conway in April. Bob has been a dispatcher with the Salem Fire Department since 1988, and was chosen for this award based not only on his dedicated 30 years of service to the Town of Salem, but also for being the primary dispatcher during two critical incidents in the last year. The Irving Street house explosion and the Cluff Crossing Road apartment building fire were significant, complex incidents that Dispatcher Sprague handled professionally and with great skill. We congratulate Bob on this career achievement!

# Finance

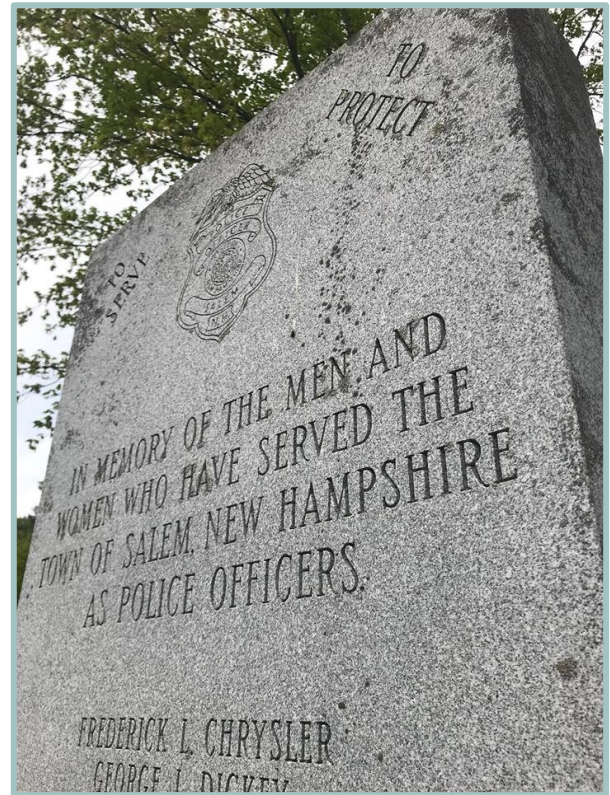


- The heron is back at Town Hall. It's located in the back of Town Hall in the marsh area to the left. Accounting and Budget Manager Melanie Murray took a few pictures of the heron last Wednesday and Thursday after work.
- Did you know that U.S. state and local governments do not follow all of the same accounting and reporting standards that commercial entities follow? U.S. state and local governments follow the financial and reporting standards established by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB). While there are many reasons why governmental accounting standards differ from commercial accounting standards, one of the primary reasons for this difference is that governmental financial reporting focuses on accountability of each organization for the stewardship of the resources that it controls. The needs of the users of the financial reports for governmental agencies are different than those of commercial entities. If you're interested in learning more about why commercial and governmental financial and reporting standards are different the GASB prepared a white paper entitled ["Why Governmental Accounting and Financial Report Is – And Should Be – Different"](#).
- Thank you to everyone that has paid their annual water and sewer demand and benefit assessments or their betterments.

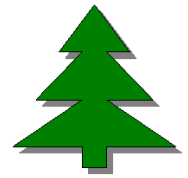
# Annual Police Memorial

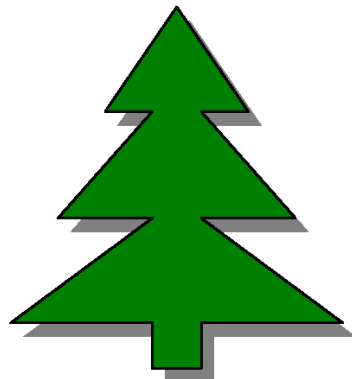
