DPW Issues Reminder About Winter Parking Ban

Salem's Department of Public Works crews work hard day and night to keep our roads safe. It is important to remember to observe the winter road regulations (see below) so that they can do their jobs. If a car is blocking a roadway, the plows will not be able to access the street to clear the snow. Our drivers will not take unnecessary risks trying to squeeze by or back up past a vehicle in icy conditions in the dark during inclement weather. They don't want to slide into or hit your vehicle. Please be considerate and follow the regulations that are in place to keep everyone safe.

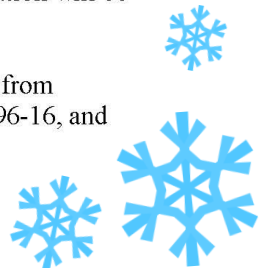
WINTER ROAD REGULATIONS

Winter Parking ban is in effect from November 15 to April 15, during which time no operator shall leave an unattended vehicle on any street, except in the case of an emergency, between the hours of 12 Midnight and 6 AM or at any time during a declared snow emergency.

Any vehicle found parking in violation will be moved at the expense of the operator or owner and by or under the direction of a police officer of the Town of Salem.

No vehicle shall be left unattended on any street when new snowfall has accumulated to a depth of 3 inches, except in case of an emergency. Any vehicle found in violation will be moved at the expense of the operator.

No person shall shovel, plow or in any way move or cause snow to be moved from private property to a street or sidewalk per Town Ordinances §296-10 and §296-16, and subject to a maximum fine of \$100.00.

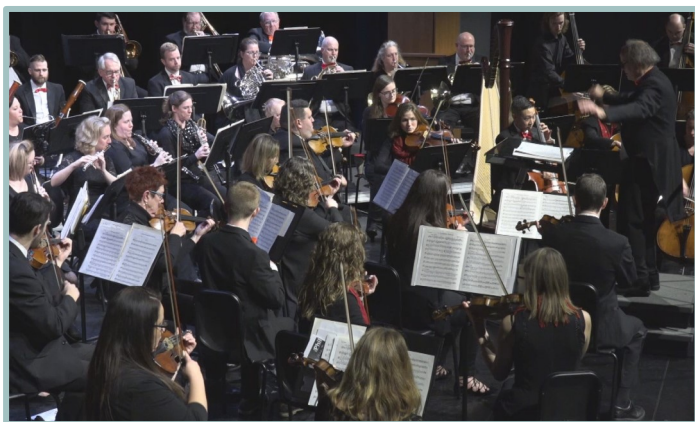

2018 Review

"We're here to help"

The Salem Fire Department experienced some significant changes and incidents in 2018. Yet again we had another record-setting year during 2018, in terms of our Operations Division as well as our Inspectional Division. The Operations Division responded to 5,605 emergency incidents, an increase of 3.6% over 2017, and a 10 year increase of greater than 27%.

2018 - By the Numbers:

- 5,605 emergency responses (new record)
- 48% simultaneous incidents (new record)
- 106 times mutual aid received (88 times for Fire and 18 times for EMS)
- \$2,254,132 fire loss
- 32 structural fires
- 66% of incidents medical; 34% of incidents fire

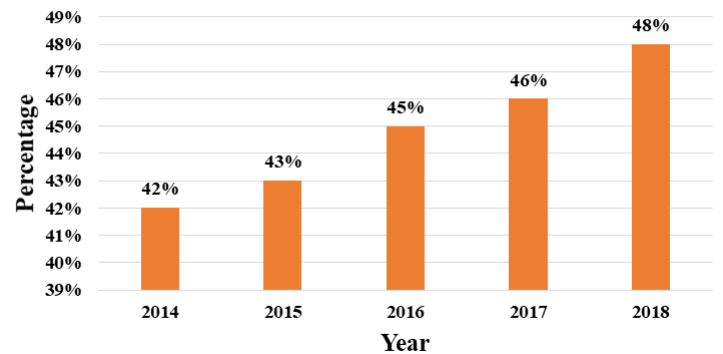
Unfortunately in 2018 we did have 1 civilian fire death which is the first fire death since 2008. Salem's fire loss for 2018 was \$2,254,132. We had 6 civilians injured during fires, and 37 firefighters suffered injuries during the course of their duties in 2018.

Fire Incidents: 1,931

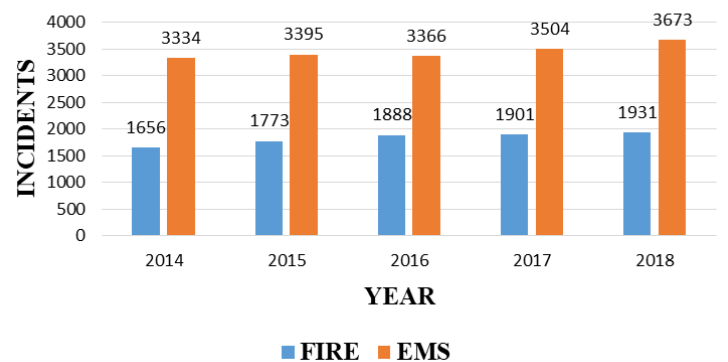
EMS Incidents: 3,673

Simultaneous Responses

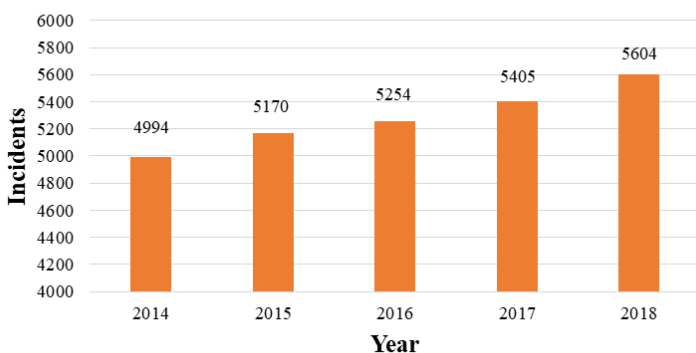


A simultaneous response is when there is more than one incident occurring at the same time.

Roy discussed the upcoming sewer improvement project and showed the ways it can help minimize the Main Street sewer situation.

The people in the meeting were appreciative of Roy's information and having the chance to express their concerns. Roy discussed the plans to alleviate the sewer overflow situation and its timeline. He talked about the best way to repair leaking joints and cracks that cause the pipe to fill with rainwater straining the capacity of the sewer line.
