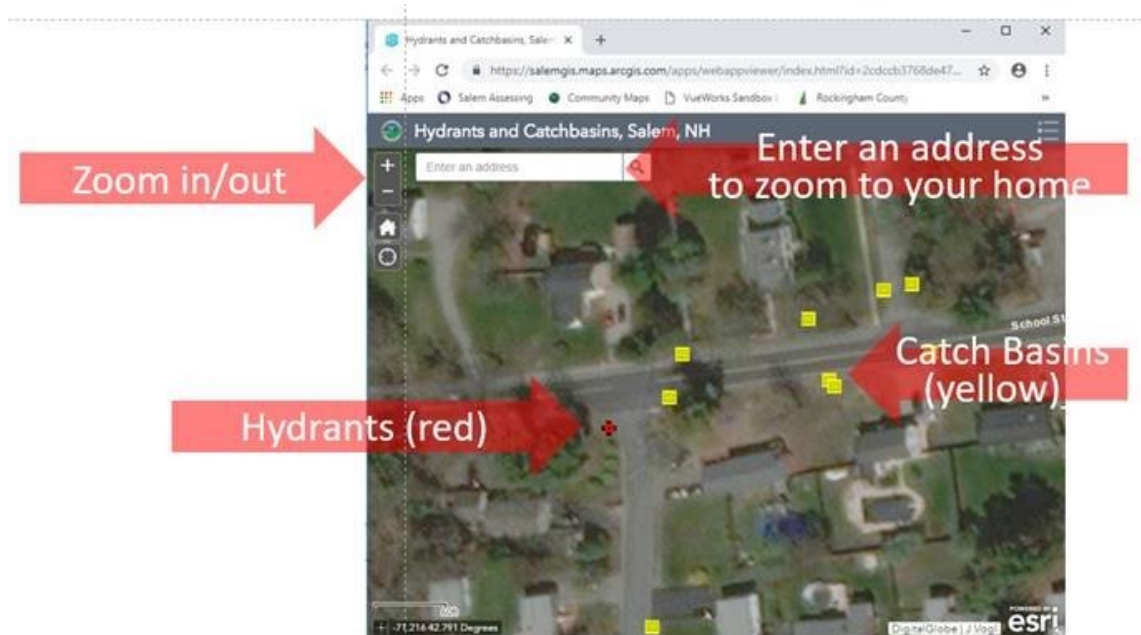

Please Help Keep Hydrants and Catch Basins Clear of Snow and Debris

Following snow events, residents and property owners are encouraged to clear snow from hydrants and catch basins. Clearing snow from hydrants improves the accessibility to these critical water supplies in the unfortunate event that they are needed by first responders. Catch basins collect storm runoff and direct water away from the roads to appropriate outlets. When covered with snow, these structures are effectively dammed and will cause standing water and poor drainage. The easiest mitigation is to shovel them out. The Town has provided a web map illustrating the location of hydrants and catch basins to help property owners locate them on or near their property. Please take a moment to view the site, zoom to your home and make note of the structures near you. When shoveling, please take an extra minute to clear these too.

Free Tax Preparation

AARP Tax-Aide is the nation's largest, free, volunteer-run tax counseling and preparation service. Their free service can answer most of the tax issues faced by low and middle-income taxpayers, with special attention to those age 60 and older.

Trained volunteer AARP tax consultants will be available at **THREE** convenient Salem locations this year, by appointment only. They will be at the Ingram Senior Center February 5th through April 10th on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 9am to 2pm. Seniors may schedule their appointment starting January 22nd by calling the Senior Center at 890-2190 provided they have all of their paperwork ready and complete.

Anyone, including seniors, may schedule an appointment for Fridays from 9am-12pm at the Southern NH University, 25 Pelham Rd., Salem or Saturdays from 9am-12pm at the Centerpoint Community Church, 101 School St., Salem by dialing 211 and they will assist you.

Be sure to pick up an interview sheet which is a must to bring with you to your tax appointment.

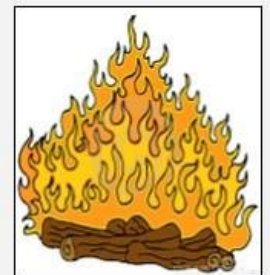

Fire Department



Facility Needs Report

The HL Turner Group with the assistance of SFD members Deputy Chief/Fire Marshal Jeff Emanuelson, Battalion Chief Jon Brackett, Captain John Judson, Captain Steve Coonrod, Captain Craig Lemire and Firefighter Nate Breton, completed a facility maintenance needs evaluation for all three fire stations.

The project objectives were:

- To provide an accurate accounting of all items that may be classified as deferred maintenance or capital repair/improvements.
- To calculate opinions of cost for all identified maintenance and capital improvement items using an established method of construction and cost estimating data.
- To assemble a report that identifies a 10-year capital planning cycle to address all identified maintenance items.

This final report gave us a comprehensive plan with estimated cost values to begin addressing the facility maintenance needs of all three fire stations. It is important to note that none of these costs include future expansion or additional building space being added to any of the fire stations. We will be conducting a "Facility Space Study" in the near future to address the issue of each fire station's space needs and plan for the future growth of the Town.

The report was broken down into short-term needs (1-2 years); mid-term needs (3-5 years) and long-term needs (8-10 years).

All total, between the three fire stations there is an estimated \$839,145 of short-term needs; \$650,100 of mid-term needs; and \$350,500 of long-term needs, which are broken down as follows:

Skill Building and Demonstrations

- The Stand Up Salem Coalition along with Salem/FireRescue will host a **NALOXONE TRAINING**.

- Local firefighters and EMTs will be assisting during this valuable training. Participants will be provided with a Naloxone kit at **NO COST** when training is completed.
- The goal is to train the public about **SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS OF OVERDOSE**, stress the importance of calling 911 as well as the immediate actions they should take to ensure everyone's safety.
- This **FREE TRAINING** is open to the public and no personal information will be collected. Those attending will have the opportunity to meet representatives of the Stand Up Salem (SUS) coalition as well as some South Central Public Health Network partners to learn more about what each are doing to support the well-being of residents in the communities they serve.
- Take advantage of a chance to learn more about these critical life saving interventions.
