

Salem Bike-Ped Corridor

Salem has been selected as the New Hampshire recipient of \$20,000 toward enhancements along the Salem Bike-Ped Corridor through McKee Foods' Outdoor Happiness movement. McKee Foods launched the Outdoor Happiness movement with the goal of supporting one project in each state that promotes outdoor activity and an active lifestyle. The types of trail enhancements funded by Salem's award could include items such as bike racks, picnic tables and seating areas, an outdoor drinking water fountain with water bottle filling station and pet bowl, solar charging station benches, a wooden train play structure, and public art installations. These placemaking amenities will enhance the safety, appearance, and user experience of the trail while celebrating and preserving Salem's railroad history. Stephen Wilkins, a Salem resident and a district sales representative for

McKee Foods, approached the Town with the suggestion of applying for the funds and supported Salem's application. We are very grateful for his assistance in securing this grant.

On Tuesday, March 5th Andre Garron and Karri Makinen of the Community Development Department and Dave Topham and Mike Banks of the Friends of Salem Bike-Ped Corridor were happy to stand on a snow-covered rail trail to gratefully receive the \$20,000 check from Steve Wilkins of McKee Foods. 5 Myths About Flooding...Busted!



Myth #1: A flood has never happened near my home or business so I don't need to worry about flooding.

FACT: It can flood anywhere it rains—plus climate change is making weather less predictable and increasing sea levels, which isn't helping. New development in flood-prone areas can also make flooding problems worse.

Myth #2: I am not in a flood zone on the FEMA flood maps so I don't need to worry about flooding.

FACT: Flood maps do not show all places where it will flood, now or in the future. In fact, almost 25% of flood insurance claims are outside of FEMA flood zones.

Myth #3: A little flooding won't cause much damage to my property.

FACT: Just 1 inch of water can cause over \$25,000 in damage to your home! Use the **Cost of Flooding Calculator** at [FloodSmart.gov](https://www.floodsmart.gov) to understand how much flood damage can cost you.

Myth #4: I can't buy flood insurance because my building is outside of a FEMA flood zone.

FACT: Anyone who lives in or owns property in a community that participates in the National Flood Insurance Program (most NH communities) can buy flood insurance. Contact your insurance agent or visit [FloodSmart.gov](https://www.floodsmart.gov) to learn more.

Myth #5: My homeowners insurance policy will cover damage from a flood.

FACT: Most homeowners insurance policies **do not** cover flood damage.

The best time to prepare for a flood is right now!

- The Town's financial statement auditors were at Town Hall the week of March 4th. They kept the Finance staff busy going through various records for fiscal year 2018.
- The Finance Department is working on the issuance of the Depot Land Acquisition bond that voters approved at the March 14, 2017 election. The sale of the bond is March 13th with Board of Selectmen approval of the sale and execution of the documents to occur on March 18th.
- This is a reminder that annual Demand and Benefit Assessment bills (DBA) will be billed around April.
