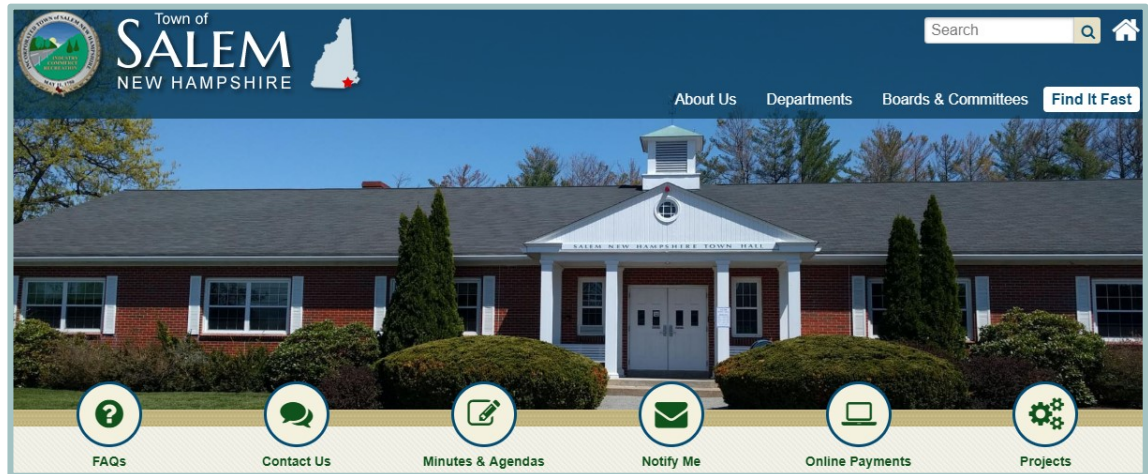

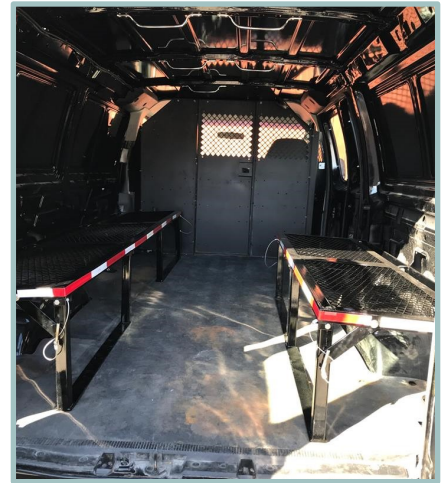

The Substance Misuse Crisis: 2018

The substance misuse crisis is still front and center in our town. Salem saw 106 overdoses total in 2018, 61 of which were opioid overdoses that resulted in 14 deaths. 70% of the overdoses were Salem residents. We continue to be active participants in StandUp Salem, a grass-roots organization aimed at prevention, education, treatment, and recovery from substance misuse.

Currently the Salem Fire Department is working on a 100% funded grant opportunity for 2019 called the **NH Project FIRST** (First responders Initiating Recovery, Support & Treatment). The grant is funded through the First Responders- Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (FR-CARA) made possible by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA).

The NH Project FIRST is a Mobile Integrated Healthcare (MIH) program for first responders. Program goals are to reduce the number of opioid overdoses and opioid overdose deaths, increase the number of at-risk individuals referred to recovery and treatment resources, and increase the number of first responders trained to administer Naloxone. This program aims to reduce the number of opioid-related deaths and increase the number of at-risk individuals on the road to treatment and recovery.

ery. First responders would train and educate at-risk individuals affected by opioid use on CPR, rescue breathing and Naloxone administration; distribute emergency opioid overdose kits and training; and share information on treatment, recovery and available social services.

This would be a joint program between the Salem Fire and Salem Police Departments.

Community Services



With spring just around the corner, the Community Services Department is ready for a whole new assortment of events, programs, and activities to begin. Senior Services was busy in March with their many program offerings, as well as their annual St. Patrick's Day party, held at The Irish Cottage in Methuen. 120 seniors attended the event and enjoyed a corn beef and cabbage dinner and music by performer Brian Corcoran. Going forward, steadfast programs will continue to take place for residents of all ages and we are happy to begin offering additional programs for expanded age groups. Most notably, our Department will be offering a Dodgeball program for ages 5-7 beginning at the end of March, as well as Adult programs, such as Karate and Theatre Arts classes. In March, the Department will be wrapping up several winter programs, including the Pats Peak Ski/Snowboard program, Special Olympics Basketball, and Court Sports. New programs will take their place beginning in April with Dodgeball (Thursday), Karate (Friday), Flag Football (Friday), Field Sports (Saturday), along with the Department's main spring event,



the Annual Fishing Derby. The derby will be held at Hedgehog Pond located at 53 Lowell Road in Salem on Saturday, April 27th. The event is for ages 15 and under with registrations for 8 and under taking place between 8:30-9:00am and 9:30-10:15am for ages 9 to 15. Fishing for ages 8 and under will take place from 9:00-10:15am and 10:20-11:20am for ages 9 to 15. The pond will be stocked with brook trout several days prior and we ask that no one fishes at Hedgehog Pond prior to the event. The event is free and will take place rain or shine.



The Community Services Department has begun accepting applications for our Community Garden, located on Town Farm Road, as well as registrations for various Senior Service programs and trips. Additionally, we are also accepting applications for summer employment. With summer quickly approaching, we are looking for enthusiastic applicants for a variety of different positions: Adventure Camp Counselor, Summer Camp Counselors, Hedgehog Park Attendants, Lifeguards, and a Tennis Instructor. Last but certainly not least, the Recreation and Senior Services Divisions are happy to welcome our new Director, Daniel Hopkins, who will begin with the Community Services Department on Monday, March 25th. The 30th Annual John P Ganley Memorial Award Luncheon was held on Friday, March 15th at the Salem Boys & Girls Club. This luncheon honors a person "who has exhibited concern, involvement and leadership in the Salem Community in the manner exemplified by Chief John P. Ganley." The winner usually gives a lot of their time and talent to many of the charitable groups in town. John P. Ganley was a Salem Police Chief who passed away in March of 1989 but his memory is recognized each year on St. Patrick's Day at this luncheon.

This year's award winner is Joanne Flynn of the Windham Country Club. Joanne has been active as a board member of the Salem Boys & Girls Club for many years and is also a co-chair for the annual auction for the club. She volunteers with the Salem Animal Rescue League and helps them raise much needed funds. 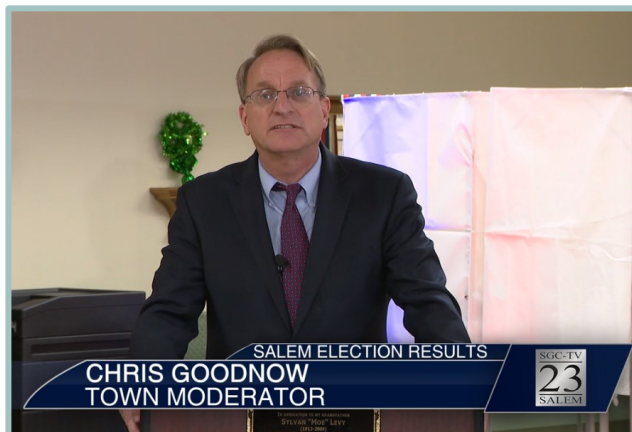
