Planning Board



The latest projects at Tuscan Village include a new 5,000 sq. ft. 120 seat restaurant called Pressed Cafe proposed along Mall Road and a 112,000 sq. ft. state-of-the-art medical office building with urgent care, radiology and lab, clinical space, and retail support services along Rockingham Park Blvd.

Finance

- The Town has changed the way we process our utility bills. Coming soon, the utility bills will come in a standard envelope. The design of the bills will be the same.
- The utility billing division of Finance is working with Ti-Sales to implement WaterSmart. WaterSmart is a cloud based platform that allows customers to see their billing and usage data. When viewing their usage they can add a layer on the graph to get the temperature and precipitation data for the time frame they are reviewing. Customers will be able to sign up with through WaterSmart to receive alerts for various scenarios such as a leak alert, if their usage is trending X% higher than their normal usage, bill forecasts (for example your bill is on track to be \$30 higher than usual). This process will likely take several months to implement prior to going live. This platform is not available yet.

- This is a reminder than annual Demand and Benefit Assessment bills (DBA) will be billed soon and may already be in the mail by the time this newsletter is published.
- Did you know that you can pay your Utility bill online? Simply go to the Town's website and pay through our website. The online bill processing vendor we use is Invoice Cloud. If you ever have any questions about paying your bill online feel free to contact the Utility Billing Division at 603-890-2042 or 603-890-2047.

- The Finance Department is hard at work processing payroll, paying vendor invoices, answering utility billing questions, ensuring departmental purchases comply with the town's purchasing and procurement policy, and providing support to all departments in town.

Community Services



Community Services has been hard at work keeping all ages active and engaged.



In the month of March an average of 977 seniors per week have been busy at the Ingram Senior Center exercising, playing cards, pool, ping pong and bingo, crafting and learning all while waiting for their snowbird friends to return

to the North. On Monday, 54 seniors went to Foxwoods to try their hand at lady luck. All four of our newly advertised trips have sold out bus 1 and some have sold out bus 2. Our newly revamped senior prom with Salem High School's HOSA Club will be a 50's Sock Hop and also sold out in the first week. Golfers, walkers, horseshoe, tennis, pickleball and softball players are all chomping at the bit to get going. We can't wait until it gets busy around here!

Salem's oldest resident on record and Boston Post Cane holder Victoria Bezuka passed away on April 7th at the age of 104. This prompted us to take a look at the statistics of some of our most seasoned citizens. We currently have 331 seniors over the age of 90, 13 of whom are over the age of 100. While not all are active at the senior center, one who is 102 years old still goes on the monthly Foxwoods trips.

In 2018 we had 208 new people join the senior center, 133 were female and 75 were male. Of those who joined, 81 were in their 60's, 88 in their 70's, 37 in their 80's and 2 in their 90's. It is never too late and you are never too old to come and have fun at the senior center.

For the younger generation, we are ramping up to keep the children busy for the summer as well. Hedgehog Park will be stocked for the annual fishing derby held on Saturday, April 27th. All the Community Garden plots have been spoken for and we are taking a waitlist. We are in the midst of enrolling children ages 3 and 4 for Palmer Pre-school's September session. The last of the spring programs will wrap up the beginning of June and the new summer programs including Rock 'N Summer Fun, Adventure Camp and X-Treme Adventure Camp will start. Rock 'N Summer Fun is 7 weeks of activities, games, crafts and field trips for ages 6 to 10. Adventure Camp for ages 11 to 15 is more bold and daring with 2 to 3 trips per week such as rock climbing, paintball and hiking. And, for the older thrill seeker ages 15 to 17, the X-Treme Adventure Camp will have them white water rafting, zip-lining and all-day deep sea fishing.
