



## Big Changes Coming to the Salem Depot



The Depot intersection at Route 28 and Main Street is changing before our eyes. Salem Government Channel got to talk with Project Engineer Lyndsay Butler about the history of the project. The approval of the partnership with DOT was in 2012 and then the warrant article for Land Acquisition and associated work for \$3.127M was approved in 2017.

She told us about the timeline for the demolition of the buildings which will be late July through August. The challenges of the project include the many utility poles and wires that are now going under ground, right-of-way permitting and the split of work between the State's responsibility and the Town's portion. The ultimate goal for the Depot Reconstruction is additional turning lanes and better traffic flow which will be appreciated by all. On that same day, well-known Salem historian Doug Seed spoke with Susan McLoughlin about the buildings in the Depot as he remembered them. That interview is full of accompanying vintage pictures of the businesses in that area including Gelt's Market and Peever's drug store. Doug spoke of an auto dealership in the Karate building and he also provided us with a current picture of a car rack/structure from the 1920s when Rockingham Park had auto racing, and we see great pictures of the racing cars on the track at Rockingham Park. They recovered a brand new Plymouth windshield made from a local Salem glass company, an old neon Ford sign, and old receipt books. These items will eventually make their way to the Salem Historical Museum and there will also be an informative show featuring those items and the process it took to retrieve them. 

# Community Services

Although there was limited access the Ingram Senior Center, the center stayed busy and saw a number facility improvements. Most notably, 17 additional parking spaces made possible by the generosity of the Salem Council on Aging Inc. A great big thank you to them for their ongoing support and dedication. Other improvements include a partition separating the cafeteria from the kitchen, which lessens some of the acoustics in the building during activity and allows the Meals on Wheels staff to go about their affairs without outside interference. Additional building modifications are also taking place to best accommodate the required social distancing and keeping our seniors safe, such as table dividers, hand sanitizing stations and touchless light switches. The requirements for the social distancing will result in smaller class sizes for the time being.



The Ingram Senior Center staff made adjustments as needed to accommodate AARP Tax Preparation of many seniors up until the deadline of July 15th. The Senior Center became a much needed resource center for residents to stop by for provisions, including toilet paper, puzzles and magazines, all of which were located outside the main entrance. Senior participants also were gracious enough to start donating home-made face coverings, which staff at our Department handed out upon request. Meals on Wheels has been collecting letters from residents involved with the Intergenerational Collaborative of Salem, NH at a drop box located next to the center's mailbox to be distributed weekly on their visits to patrons receiving food.

The Recreation Division was creative in modifying a number of programs that started in June with Monday and Thursday Dance Aerobic programs, instructed by Marie Cammarata. The dance program takes place outdoors in the Ingram Senior Center parking lot, where participants partake in social distancing, while still being able to take part in a popular activity, which takes place consistently throughout the year. In July, recreational programming expanded to include Monday and Thursday tap dance classes, tennis lessons for ages 8 to 17 years old,

Adventure Camp for ages 11 to 15 years old, a virtual track and field program, and a number of weekly and bi-weekly programs taking place at the Ingram Senior Center parking lot which include – but are not limited to – yoga, outdoor walking groups, story time nature walks, corn hole, painting classes, photography groups, outdoor bingo and arts/craft projects.



Community Services was also thrilled to organize a concert for our seniors that honored our dedicated first responders, firefighters and police. The event was held in the parking lot of the senior center at 6:30pm on July 29<sup>th</sup>. The sun had dropped beneath the trees leaving a nicely shaded, comfortable and bug free seating area. Everyone brought their own chairs and sat safely distanced from one another. The gathering included 90 seniors, the staff of Community Services and more than 20 members of the Fire and Police Departments. Everyone was elated to get out of their homes and have something enjoyable to do.

The entertainment, provided by Chris and Donna Colella of Another Shot Acoustic Duo, filled the parking lot with beautiful music that had the group singing and smiling. The evening closed with a patriotic song, paying tribute to Fire and Police, with members of the departments lined up at the front and everyone in attendance standing, singing, and applauding. # Finance

- Voters approved bonding the West Duston water and sewer services expansion project in March (article 9). On August 12<sup>th</sup> the Town will sell a bond anticipation note (BAN) for this project.
- The Finance and Human Resources departments are working together to implement Kronos, a time and attendance platform for certain town employees. This system will reduce the amount of paper we use as well as provide for a more efficient payroll process.
- The Town of Salem is offering a free portal to our water customers that allows customers to view their water consumption data as well as sign up for automated alerts that will notify you of potential high volume, continuous flow, and bill forecast notifications.
