## Deputy Police Chief Joel Dolan Honored with Award



On February 13, Joel Dolan, Deputy Chief of the Salem Police Department was named the NH Retail Association's 2020 Law Enforcement Partner of the Year.

## Carbon Monoxide Safety



### Did you know?

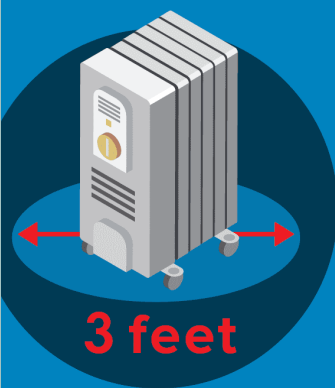
**More than 150 people in the U.S. die every year from accidental nonfire-related carbon monoxide poisoning.**

Carbon monoxide or CO is a colorless and odorless gas. CO poisoning can occur when a fuel-burning appliance or machine, such as a furnace, heater or generator, is not working or vented properly. Breathing in CO at high levels can be fatal.

**Learn what you can do to protect your family from the dangers of CO.**

- ✓ Install and maintain CO alarms inside your home to provide early warning of CO.
- ✓ Install CO alarms in a central location outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of your home.
- ✓ Use portable generators outdoors in well-ventilated areas away from all doors, windows and vents.
- ✓ Make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove and fireplace are clear of snow and other debris.

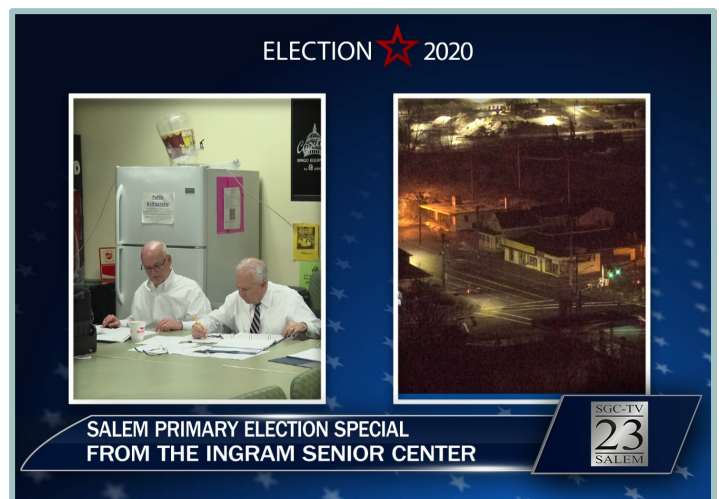
## SCTV Election Coverage



SGC 23 covered all the Election Day action in Salem, NH as the First in the Nation Presidential Primary was underway. We spoke to the Assistant Town Moderators from the Soule School- Bernie Campbell, Senior Center- Ellen Emerson and from North Salem Elementary- Mike Carney. They all had a similar message about voter turnout, "slow but steady" that held true throughout the day. SGC 23 broadcasted Salem's results of the Presidential Primary Live on SGC 23, Livestream and Facebook. Informational packages were recorded earlier in the day and rolled into the evening coverage. This included a piece with Planning Director, Ross Moldoff, about political signs and where they can and cannot be placed. There was also a wrap-up of the last two days before the primary where four of the candidates stumped their way through our town, landing three of them at the top.



It all wrapped up at 10:45 PM when Town Moderator Chris Goodnow read the results for Salem. Donald Trump topped the Republican ticket and Pete Buttigieg just edged out Bernie Sanders on the Democrat side. Amy Klobuchar worked her way into the top three. ## PRESS RELEASE FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE

The Supervisors of the Checklist of Salem, New Hampshire will be in Session on Saturday morning, February 29, between 11:00 and 11:30 on the lower level of the Municipal Office Building for the purpose of registering new voters for the upcoming Town Election.

Registered voters may also make changes or corrections to their existing data, or switch their party affiliations at this session. This will be the last opportunity for a resident of Salem to register to vote if he/she wants their name to appear on the checklist that will be used for Town Election on Tuesday, March 10<sup>th</sup>, 2020. New Hampshire election law does however, allow a person to register to vote at the polls if they present required documentation. A picture ID and proof of domicile is required. (A drivers' license is acceptable.) Naturalized citizens must show a passport or documented citizenship papers.

Residents may also register to vote with the Town Clerk at any time during regular office hours through Friday, February 28, 2020.

Copies of the current voter checklist are available to view at the Kelley Library reference desk and at the Town Clerk's office.
